Its profits exceed \$150 billion each year. That is more than the annual profits of Exxon, Microsoft, BP, Samsung and Apple - combined.</p> <p>https://www.TraffickingInstitute.org</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">11</p> <p>A survey found that 91% of survivor respondents had a criminal record which resulted from being trafficked. A criminal record, even an arrest without a conviction, often leads to doors being slammed shut.
